PROGRAMMES IMPLEMENTED DURING THE YEAR

Emergency Response to COVID 19



Food distribution during COVID pandemic

As Covid-19 pandemic continued to spread across the countries and cities, Africa and particularly Kenya wes greatly affected in the year 2020, 2021 and 2022 when the COVID wave spread very fast in the country. This changed peoples' way of life and their daily routine being disrupted. Schools, businesses and offices were closed down to avoid social distance as guided by the Ministry of Health. The government encouraged citizens to wear face masks, frequent hand washing and use of sanitizers to reduce the spread of the virus. Even

though, the pandemic affected individuals at global level, those living in informal settlements such as Mathare were most affected. This is because of the high

overcrowding, high unemployment rate, food insecurity, poor drainage sanitation, lack of access to clean water that exposed their vulnerability to the virus. Self isolation and social distancing was practically impossible. LEC had to work around the clock to respond to the humanitarian crises that had faced our community members. Through the support of our partners and well wishers we managed to support 200 households with food support, 300 households with

with food support, 300 households with clean water, 355 households with hygiene kits including liquid soap, tissue papers, sanitary towels, and face masks. 200 families were sensitized on measures to reduce the spread of

COVID 19. Families' livelihoods were disrupted and LEC supported 20 women to revive their small scale businesses through business capital boost.15 hand washing points were installed in common areas including chief's place, local dispensaries and at the common roads to enhance hygiene practices.

Education

In 2021, 350 children had access to quality education through LEC's community school that provides pre primary education and primary education. As an organization, we strongly believe you can empower a community when you ensure its children go to school to get quality education but also ensure smooth transition from pre primary to primary, to secondary school then eventually to college or university. Through our community conversations with community members, we sensitize parents

to ensure their

children attend school to not only unlock their potential but also protect them from violence, abuse and exploitation.

LEC also provided educational scholarships to 15 children in secondary schools. This included paying the school fees to these children who are vulnerable and would otherwise have dropped out of school exposing them to teenage pregnancies, child marriage and other forms of exploitations. The sponsorship programme provides school fees to these children throughout their 4 years in high school. Besides school fees, we provided leadership programme that exposes them to universities and other opportunities in life.

Gender Based Violence

As a result of effects of 2019 pandemic, COVID many families especially from the experienced slum areas violence due to disrupted livelihoods. Women and children were the most affected within communities. As LEC we intensified our efforts in preventing responding to Gender Based Violence. During the year we to continued spread awareness. sensitized communities and addressed sexual and gender based

violence across Mathare and Korogsho slums. We merged efforts with other community based organizations and worked closely with local authority and the police to ensure the perpetrators face their actions. During the year, we created awareness and sensitized 4,556 members from the slum of Mathare and Korogsho, 217 cases on case management. 217 received basic counseling from the organization social worker, 12

were referred for specialized counseling and therapy to a local government health facility and 7 cases went to court with the support of our probonal lawyer LEC's Board who is also member. Rural areas were with equally not spared increased cases of Gender Based Violence. Our satellite offices in Busia received 87 cases while Kakamega office received 33 cases. Our social workers in partnership with local governments and other CSOs supported the survivors to have access to the required services. Busia office reached 1.244 community members with

awareness raising and sensitization which was mainly done through churches, chief barazas and forums at schools we partnered with. In Kakamega, we reached out to 573 households with awareness raising and sensitization forums. 28 women were supported with seed capital start small scale businesses to enhance their resilience and also prevent them from further becoming victims of GBV

Child Protection programmes

Child protection activities form part of our core implementation focus within LEC Community Organization. Each year we support children to be their own advocates

through empowering them with knowledge and information to help them prevent and themselves from abuse protect exploitation. During the year we sensitized 2,150 children on forms of abuse and preventive measures. Our strategy involved Child Rights Clubs comprising of 30 to 40 members per school. These children were taken through series of training thereby becoming ambassadors of children rights within their schools. We targeted 3 schools in Mathare slums, 1 school in korogosho, 5 schools in Busia and 3 schools in Kakamega area. 504 children who are members of child rights clubs were trained of forms of child abuse including sexual abuse, physical abuse,

child labour, child trafficking, corporal punishment, online sexual abuse and reporting channels within their communities when such abuse happen. These children eventually became child rights ambassadors and were able to sensitize other children creating awareness against child abuse within their schools and communities.

Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

Being a slum area, Mathare slum is characterized by inadequate toilets and bathrooms

and limited access to clean water the vulnerability increasing community members to waterborne diseases. Lack of proper drainage system worsens the situation as sewer often mix with water meant for domestic use. During the year, LEC sensitized 623 community members on good hygiene The practices. communities members noted lack of toilets and bathrooms to be the leading factor to pollution of the common Nairobi

water and poor drainage systems

that exposes them to waterborne diseases. LEC thereafter approached a partner who promised to renovate toilets and bathrooms to the community members. LEC also reached out to the local authority and presented community members challenges. As a sustainable way of managing waste within Mathare slums, LEC supported youths to form a waste management group that works with local authority and community members to ensure the wastes are well managed by the community members and the group is in charge of collection which helps them to manage wastes within the slum area but also create some income for the group sustainability.

Sports and Youths

Our approach on Sports for Development project engages youths in team-based sports to teach teamwork, leadership, and most importantly used as a tool for behavior change. 150 youths participated in workshops on sexual and reproductive health, Waste Management, and gender based violence. Our sports programming acts as an avenue of inviting youth to participate in additional climate change activities such as waste recycling, cleaning of our natural resources such as rivers.

Conclusion

As we continue to empower our communities, we believe in participatory approach where all of our project beneficiaries, key stakeholders and communities are involved in our activities all through from design, implementation and feedback. We believe in partnerships within our communities to enable us reach and change the communities. We continue to urge you to continue partnering with us in reaching our ultimate goal.
